STRENGTHENING JEWISH IDENTITY

Jewish day schools foster a love of learning, inquisitiveness, and deep Jewish knowledge that adds meaning and value to students' day-to-day lives and guides them throughout their lifetimes.

They offer a safe, loving environment where Jewish students are empowered to know who they are and where they come from, forge lasting bonds to one another and meaningful connections to our community, create a moral compass for how they want to live and act, and develop deep confidence and pride in their Jewish identities – all of which gives them the foundation they need to better navigate their future.

83%

of Jewish adults in Cleveland who attended day school are highly engaged in all or most aspects of Jewish life¹, such as:

- Lighting candles for Chanukah and Shabbat
- Attending seders
- Discussing Jewish topics
- Reading Jewish publications
- Attending religious services
- Following news about Israel
- Donating to Jewish organizations

¹ Preliminary research from the 2022 Cleveland Jewish Community Study shows a correlation between Jewish educational experiences during childhood and the type of Jewish engagement in adulthood, with the strongest correlation exhibited by those who attended day school.

The day school graduates of today will become tomorrow's summer camp counselors, synagogue youth group leaders, Hillel and Birthright leaders, Jewish communal professional and lay leaders, Jewish families, and philanthropists – as well as key allies and partners with other communities and influential leaders in Greater Cleveland.

BUILDING JEWISH RESILIENCY

SURGING INTEREST AND ENROLLMENT

In a recent Prizmah² survey,

60%

of schools reported enrolling new students due to the current climate, many from families who were not known prospects.

In a recent Jewish Federations of North America survey

38%

of parents with kids in a secular private school reported considering making the move to Jewish day schools.

DECADES OF DEDICATION, LEADERSHIP, AND GROWTH

The first Jewish day school in Jewish Cleveland was founded by Rabbi N.W. Dessler (z"l) in 1943. Five years later, the Jewish Federation of Cleveland's allocation to the Hebrew Academy of Cleveland made us the first Federation in the country to fund a day school.

From those early years, the Cleveland day school movement has expanded and developed. Our

five Federation beneficiary day schools represent a range of observance and religious views, act as thriving communities of belonging within our wider Jewish community, and provide educations that give students the opportunity to choose their own futures. They are positive hubs of vibrancy that each complement and influence one another:





Fuchs Mizrachi School (Mizrachi) is a religious Zionist day school that serves children in early childhood through twelfth grade.





Gross Schechter Day School (GSDS) offers infant care through eighth grade education, providing core values and Judaic studies centered around Conservative Judaism.





Hebrew Academy of Cleveland (HAC) is an Orthodox day school that educates students from early childhood through college preparatory high school.





Joseph and Florence Mandel Jewish Day School (Mandel JDS) is a pluralistic day school for children in early childhood through eighth grade.







Yeshiva Derech Hatorah (YDT) is an Orthodox day school that serves boys in pre-K through eighth grade and girls in pre-K through twelfth grade.

Today, decades of success have proven the strength, depth, longevity, and power of the collaboration and connection between our day schools and the wider community. There is no doubt that the excellence of our day school system plays a vital role in Cleveland's unparalleled success and leadership across Jewish organizations nationally and internationally.

The partnership between the Federation, the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland (JEC), and community leaders has created a Jewish educational system that has flourished. Cleveland has one of the highest day school market penetration rates in the country.

GROWING ENROLLMENT

n total, there were 3,573 students enrolled in our five day schools (early childhood through 12th grade for applicable day schools) during the 2023-2024 school year. This is a remarkable achievement, especially considering that this represents nearly the same number of students as the Beachwood

City and Orange City school districts combined, and nearly three-quarters the size of Cleveland Heights-University Heights (CH-UH). Additionally, all five day schools have seen overall enrollment growth (including EC-12) over the past ten years.

INVESTING IN DAY SCHOOL EDUCATION


our community values Jewish day school education, currently investing more than \$4.5 million annually in our schools collectively through the Federation and JEC. The state of Ohio's EdChoice scholarship program remains a significant source of revenue, as does the Tax Credit Scholarship Program. However, these sources of funding are vulnerable to change per the priorities of future administrations.

Overall, our day schools are in strong financial positions through a combination of sound fiscal

management, capitalizing on available government funding, generous philanthropic investment, and savvy partnerships and initiatives.

However, costs continue to outpace the dollars allocated to our schools. To help offset this gap, all day schools need to raise substantial additional funds each year and have been forced to increase tuition in recent years to keep up with the rising costs of educating students, while at the same time working to keep tuition accessible and provide financial aid to as many families as possible.

We need to invest more in our children's education. Jewish Cleveland's day schools spend less per student than their public peers and the private school average – while providing a dual-curriculum of Judaic and general studies. Our day schools are efficient with the funding that they do have and provide this enriching education with much lower resources than their public and private school counterparts. With additional resources, our day schools could do even more for even more students.

ONE COORDINATED, COMPREHENSIVE CAMPAIGN IS KEY

JEWISH CLEVELAND'S TRANSFORMATIVE DAY SCHOOL CAMPAIGN



\$100M Endowment (\$20M/School):

\$50 million endowment donations from the community to be matched with up to \$50 million by the Mandel Foundation.

Each school will add \$20 million to their endowments, and with the 5% draw on the increase they will have \$1 million more per year to spend.

Up to \$80M Capital (\$20M/Participating School):

\$40 million capital donations from the community to be matched with up to \$40 million by the Mandel Foundation.

Four schools with extensive capital needs are eligible for this part of the campaign. Conversations with school leadership identified the capital needs and related costs with ranges that average around \$20 million each.

ENHANCING EXCELLENCE AND ACCESSIBILITY

Our day schools are vibrant and continuously innovating, as evidenced by their enrollment growth. Today, our community is investing in their excellence and accessibility to engage even more students in day school education.

Join our community's unprecedented campaign to ensure our day schools achieve all this and more:

Recruit and retain the best teachers by providing competitive compensation packages and advanced professional development programs.

Attract and develop the strongest professional and lay leadership through strategic development initiatives and pipelines.

Improve the caliber of education and innovation through smaller class sizes, new programmatic initiatives in Judaic and general studies as well as extracurriculars, and specialized programs such as STEM, fine arts, and internships.

Create more ways to engage families in Jewish learning,

deepen connections to Israel, and strengthen Hebrew education by bringing in additional shlichim (emissaries from Israel).

Expand access to a wider range of students with different financial circumstances and learning needs, including both academic support and enrichment, through increased affordability, intervention, individual and small-group instruction, social-emotional learning, and mental health initiatives.

Build physical capacity to serve increasing numbers of students by acquiring new facilities and expanding buildings to add more classroom and communal spaces.

Renovate and upgrade facilities to create modern learning environments that provide the appropriately designed spaces to enhance the academic experience.

Enhancing access to educational excellence across all our day schools at the same time ensures every Jewish family in Cleveland has the opportunity to choose the school community that best represents their specific Jewish identity and goals for their children's future.
